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SUPERVISED RELEASE

Upon release from imprisonment, you will be on supervised release for a term of 3 years.

MANDATORY CONDITIONS

- 1. You must not commit another federal, state or local crime.
- You must not unlawfully possess a controlled substance.
- 3. You must refrain from any unlawful use of a controlled substance. You must submit to one drug test within 15 days of release from imprisonment and at least two periodic drug tests thereafter, as determined by the court.
 - The above drug testing condition is suspended, based on the court's determination that you pose a low risk of future substance abuse.
- 4. You must cooperate in the collection of DNA as directed by the probation officer.

 The defendant shall comply with the standard conditions that have been adopted by this court (set forth below).

 The defendant shall also comply with the additional conditions on the attached page.

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STANDARD CONDITIONS OF SUPERVISION

As part of your supervised release, you must comply with the following standard conditions of supervision. These conditions are imposed because they establish the basic expectations for your behavior while on supervision and identify the minimum tools needed by probation officers to keep informed, report to the court about, and bring about improvements in your conduct and condition.

- 1. You must report to the probation office in the federal judicial district where you are authorized to reside within 72 hours of your release from imprisonment, unless the probation officer instructs you to report to a different probation office or within a different time frame. After initially reporting to the probation office, the defendant will receive instructions from the court or the probation officer about how and when the defendant must report to the probation officer, and the defendant must report to the probation officer as instructed.
- 2. After initially reporting to the probation office, you will receive instructions from the court or the probation officer about how and when you must report to the probation officer, and you must report to the probation officer as instructed.
- 3. You must not knowingly leave the federal judicial district where you are authorized to reside without first getting permission from the court or the probation officer.
- 4. You must answer truthfully the questions asked by your probation officer
- 5. You must live at a place approved by the probation officer. If you plan to change where you live or anything about your living arrangements (such as the people you live with), you must notify the probation officer at least 10 days before the change. If notifying the probation officer in advance is not possible due to unanticipated circumstances, you must notify the probation officer within 72 hours of becoming aware of a change or expected change.
- 6. You must allow the probation officer to visit you at any time at your home or elsewhere, and you must permit the probation officer to take any items prohibited by the conditions of your supervision that he or she observes in plain view.
- 7. You must work full time (at least 30 hours per week) at a lawful type of employment, unless the probation officer excuses you from doing so. If you do not have full-time employment you must try to find full-time employment, unless the probation officer excuses you from doing so. If you plan to change where you work or anything about your work (such as your position or your job responsibilities), you must notify the probation officer at least 10 days before the change. If notifying the probation officer at least 10 days in advance is not possible due to unanticipated circumstances, you must notify the probation officer within 72 hours of becoming aware of a change or expected change.
- 8. You must not communicate or interact with someone you know is engaged in criminal activity. If you know someone has been convicted of a felony, you must not knowingly communicate or interact with that person without first getting the permission of the probation officer.
- 9. If you are arrested or questioned by a law enforcement officer, you must notify the probation officer within 72 hours.
- 10. You must not own, possess, or have access to a firearm, ammunition, destructive device, or dangerous weapon (i.e., anything that was designed, or was modified for, the specific purpose of causing bodily injury or death to another person such as nunchakus or tasers).
- 11. You must not act or make any agreement with a law enforcement agency to act as a confidential human source or informant without first getting the permission of the court.
- 12. If the probation officer determines that you pose a risk to another person (including an organization), the probation officer may require you to notify the person about the risk and you must comply with that instruction. The probation officer may contact the person and confirm that you have notified the person about the risk.
- 13. You must follow the instructions of the probation officer related to the conditions of supervision.

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ADDITIONAL CONDITIONS OF SUPERVISED RELEASE

- 1. The defendant shall be prohibited from incurring new credit charges, opening additional lines of credit, or making an obligation for any major purchases without approval of the Probation Officer.
- 2. The defendant shall provide the probation officer access to any requested financial information.
- 3. The defendant shall cooperate with the Internal Revenue Service regarding all outstanding taxes, interest, and penalties relating to the offense of conviction.
- 4. The defendant shall cooperate in the collection of DNA, as directed by the Probation Officer.
- The defendant shall notify the United States Probation Office, in writing, of any interest in property obtained, directly or indirectly, including any interest obtained under any other name, or entity, including a trust, partnership or corporation. The Defendant is prohibited from transferring or liquidating any asset or interest in property owned directly or indirectly by Defendant, including any interest held or owned under any other name or entity, including trusts, partnerships and/or corporations.
- 6. The mandatory drug testing requirements of the Violent Crime Control Act are waived.

SCHEDULE OF PAYMENTS

Special Assessment in the amount of \$100.00 is due in full and immediately.

While in the custody of the Bureau of Prisons, you shall either (1) pay at least \$25 quarterly if working non-Unicor or (2) pay at least 50 percent of your monthly earnings if working in a Unicor position. Upon release from custody, you are ordered to begin making payments of 10% of monthly income per month for payment of restitution and \$50.00 per month for payment of the fine and this payment schedule shall continue until such time as the Court is notified by the defendant, the victim or the government that there has been a material change in your ability to pay.

The defendant is hereby ordered to begin payment immediately and continue to make payments to the best of his ability until this obligation is satisfied. While in custody, you are directed to participate in the Bureau of Prisons Financial Responsibility Program, if eligible, and upon release from custody, the defendant shall adhere to a payment schedule comprised of the balance of the unpaid restitution, as determined by the Probation Office.

Unless the court has expressly ordered otherwise in the special instructions above, if this judgment imposes a period of imprisonment, payment of criminal monetary penalties shall be due during the period of imprisonment. All criminal monetary penalties, except those payments made through the Federal Bureau of Prisons' Inmate Financial Responsibility Program, are made to the clerk of the court, unless otherwise directed by the court, the probation officer, or the United States attorney.

The defendant shall receive credit for all payments previously made toward any criminal monetary penalties imposed.

Payments shall be applied in the following order: (1) assessment, (2) restitution principal, (3) restitution interest, (4) fine principal, (5) fine interest, (6) community restitution, (7) JVTA assessment, (8) penalties, and (9) costs, including cost of prosecution and court costs.
