HENRY BLACKMER, OIL MAN, 92, DIES

Spent 25 Years Abroad to Avoid Teapot Dome Case

GENEVA, May 26 (Reuters) -Henry M. Blackmer, the Colorado millionaire who spent much of his life in self-imposed exile in Europe to avoid testifying in the Teapot Dome oil scandal investigation, died yesterday in his home here. His age was 92.

Absent 25 Years

Mr. Blackmer slipped away to Paris in 1924 when the Gov-ernment began questioning business associates about the sale of Teapot Dome naval oil reserves to private interests.

He took with him a fortune estimated at \$25,000,000 and the books of the Continental Trading Company, one of the firms the Government was most curious about.

It was alleged that Fall had received \$230,000 out of the \$3,080,000 profit made by the Continental Company, which then went out of business.
